2. STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

The Charity is an unincorporated association, governed by the Rules of The English Ceramic Circle ('The Rules'), which were revised at and took effect from the Annual General Meeting held on 19 March 2016. A copy of the Rules can be found on the Charity's website.

The Trustees of the Charity form the Committee of the English Ceramic Circle. The Committee comprises not more than fifteen members who are elected (for a term of not more than 3 years with the right to re-election) and two appointed members who are the Honorary Editor and the Honorary Librarian. The Committee has power to co-opt not more than three members, and a list of the current Trustees is set out above. Having served for three years, Roger Massey and Nicholas Panes stepped down as President and Treasurer respectively at the annual general meeting in March, and Nigel Cooke resigned as a Trustee on 2nd September. The Trustees wish to thank all three for their valuable contributions to the running of the Circle during their terms in office.

The Charity has no employees. The Accounts have been subject to Independent Examination as required by Part 8 of the Charities Act 2011.

3. A FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Circle had a successful year, earning a surplus of £7824 (2015 £9173). Total income increased substantially, principally because the Circle organised a visit to the United States

Seminar income increased as a result of holding two seminars during the year, but subscriptions and donations fell. Advertising income also declined substantially as a result of a number of previous advertisers declining to repeat their advertisements in the Transactions. ECC is a registered charity and we encourage donations and bequests from both members and the public to enable the Circle's activities to continue.

Mailing costs reduced significantly following the committee's decision last year to use email wherever possible for this purpose, and we would encourage any member who has not already done so to please supply us with an email address.

4. OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES & ACHIEVEMENTS

The Objectives of the Charity, as defined in section 2 of The Rules, are:

- **a)** To advance the public knowledge and appreciation of ceramics and enamels manufactured, decorated, or used in the British Isles.
- **b)** To promote research and study in all matters relating to ceramics and enamels manufactured, decorated, or used in the British Isles and to disseminate the useful knowledge gained for the public benefit.

The Charity provides public benefit through its Transactions and other publications, which are available in a variety of libraries and also for sale to the public, and through its public meetings and seminars.

The English Ceramic Circle held meetings during the year at the lecture theatre at the Kensington Library, Hornton Street, Kensington, London. At these meetings, papers were presented on a wide variety of ceramic related topics. The Circle also held a series of monthly evening lectures in the lecture theatre of Bonham's in Montpelier Street, London.

The Circle held a successful one day seminar "A Taste for the Antique - The Neo-classical Style and Ceramics in England c. 1770-1800" to coincide with the summer Art Antiques London fair with a second day held at the Wedgwood Museum in Barlaston. A further seminar, "Aldgate to Vauxhall - London Delftware seminar" was held in conjunction with the Museum of london.

The Circle maintains a printing reserve to cover the anticipated costs of printing the papers delivered to members but not yet published. At year end this stood at £18500 (2015 £18500). All other reserves totalling £53,990 (2015 £46,167) are available to finance the Circle's activities

Regular Publications

The English Ceramic Circle publishes an annual publication, The Transactions of the English Ceramic Circle. During 2016 the first of a series of bi-annual newslatters was also distributed to the membership.

Early in 2015 your Circle was able for the first time to make ECC Transactions available online. Some 80 years of Transactions are now available online in searchable digitised form. The searches allow subscribers to find articles and references of interest almost immediately. Apart from a nominal registration fee this archive is made available free for ECC members and is available to members of the public for a fee designed to recover website costs. ECC members all around the world have signed up and a small income was also earned from public access to the archive.

Membership

The Circle offers annual subscription membership which entitles Members to receive the annual Transactions and sometimes (at the discretion of the Committee) other publications without further charge. Membership is offered to individuals, joint membership to two individuals at the same address, and Institutional Membership. The latter category entitles Institutions to send any nominated individual to meetings organised by ECC.

Membership numbers fell slightly during the year as age takes its toll and subscription income declined as a result. However a number of additional members provided gift aid declarations and we urge any UK tax payer who has not done so to consider this valuable addition to the Circle's income.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31st October, 2016

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared using the historic cost convention and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The statements have been voluntarily compiled on an accruals basis to comply with the principle recommendations of the Charity Commission's publication "Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities" [2015].

Income from Members' subscriptions, which entitles members to receive the annual Transactions publication and to attend both public and members' meetings, is recognised in the year in which those meetings take place.

Income from Gift Aid is accounted for in the financial year in which the refund claim is submitted. Income from publication grants, provided such grant is committed, is accounted for in the year in which the relevant publication costs are incurred.

The Circle holds stocks of past Transactions which it sells to the public and to members. Some of these publication are many years old and the trustees take the view that maintaining a stock recording system to maintain these relatively low valued stocks would not be justified. Accordingly, subject to the matters set out below, publication costs are expensed in the accounts in the year in which they are printed.

The Circle maintains a Printing Reserve to make allowance for the cost of unpublished Transactions, or supplements to Transactions, where the relevant papers have been presented by Members to the Circle but the printing not yet undertaken.

(b) Statutory Disclosures

During the year two committee members were reimbursed for travel and accommodation costs incurred on behalf of the Circle at a total cost of £285. No other trustee expenses were incurred.

(c) Depreciation

The Circle's computer and projection equipment is fully written down. It was depreciated on a straight line basis over its expected useful life, namely 3 years.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiners

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for the current year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
